

George Washington (1789-1797)

President Washington was the United States of America's very first president.

Did not have wooden teeth, as rumored. In fact, his teeth were made of ivory, bone, and other materials.



John Adams (1797-1801)

President Adams Second president of the US.

Was the first president to live in the White House.



Thomas Jefferson (1801-1809)

President Jefferson invented the swiveling chair.

He was known to answer the door of the White House all by himself.

He had nine brothers and sisters.



James Madison (1809-1817)

President Madison was only 5'4" and about 100lbs.

The only other president to sign the US Constitution besides George Washington.



James Monroe (1817-1825)

President Monroe's daughter, Maria, was the first person to be married at the White House.

He was the last president to be an adult during the Revolutionary War.



John Quincy Adams (1825-1829)

President Adams was the son of John Adams, 2nd President of the US.

He loved science and believed science was very important to the future of the United States.



Andrew Jackson (1829-1837)

President Jackson was a fan of gun duels. He lived with a bullet in his chest for 40 years from a duel where he was shot.

He was famous for his play in the War of 1812.



Martin Van Buren (1837-1841)

President Van Buren was the first president to be born a citizen of the US.

The saying "OK" or "Okay" became popular when he was president. It stands for "Old Kinderhook".



William Henry Harrison (1841)

President Harrison was only president for 33 days before he passed away from illness.



John Tyler (1841-1845)

President Tyler was the first Vice President to become President when the President passed away.

He had 15 children!



James K Polk (1845-1849)

President Polk added the state of Texas to the United States.

The K in his middle name stands for Knox.

He was the first president to have his photograph taken while in office.



Zachary Taylor (1849-1850)

Second president to pass away while in office, but this time, from what they believe was bacteria in bad milk.

He liked to wear a straw hat at the White House. People said he wore farm clothes under his suit jacket.



Millard Fillmore (1850-1853)

President Fillmore grew up in a log cabin.

He loved to read. When he heard the Library of Congress was on fire, he ran to help put out the fire.



Franklin Pierce (1853-1857)

President Franklin Pierce had no middle name.

He was the first president to have a Christmas tree in the White House.



James Buchanan (1857-1861)

President Buchanan was the only unmarried man who was made president.

He was the last president before the state of the Civil War.



Abraham Lincoln (1861-1865)

President Lincoln was very tall, standing at 6'4", he is the tallest president on record.

He was a gifted storyteller and loved a good joke.

He was the first president who kept a full beard.



Andrew Johnson (1865-1869)

President Johnson was a tailors apprentice and he made all of his own suits, even after he was president.

He loved to read so much that he paid people to read to him while he sewed.



Ulysses S. Grant (1869-1877)

An avid cigar smoker, people would regularly send president Grant cigars to celebrate victories.

Grant was very important in the making of the National Parks System.



Rutherford B. Hayes (1877-1881)

President Hayes announced ahead of time that he would only serve one term as president and he stayed true to his word.

He won the closest presidential race in history. In fact, he lost the popular vote, but won the electoral college.



James A. Garfield (1881)

President Garfield was ambidextrous, which means he could write well with both hands. It was rumored that he could sometimes write with both hands AT THE SAME TIME!

He was the first president whose mother attended his inauguration.



Chester A. Arthur (1881-1885)

A very snappy dresser, president Arthur was known to change suits between events even in the same day.

He was an excellent fisherman.

His nickname was "Elegant Arthur".



Grover Cleveland (1885-1889 & 1893-1897)

President Cleveland is the only president to hold the office for two non-consecutive terms (which means they were not back to back) making him our 23rd and our 25th president.



Benjamin Harrison (1889-1893)

President Harrison is the grandson of William Harrison, the United States 9th President.

He was the first president to have electricity put into the White House.



William McKinley (1897-1901)

President McKinley considered the carnation, the flower, his good luck charm and wore them until the day he passed away.

He is the only president to be married IN the White House.



Theodore Roosevelt (1901-1909)

Theodore Roosevelt, nicknamed Teddy, was known for being a fierce hunter, but when he refused to kill a bear cub while on a hunting trip a toy maker started producing Teddy Bears, which are still what toy bears are called today!

He was the youngest man to ever hold the office of the presidency (after McKinley died).



William Howard Taft (1909-1913)

Commonly known as the largest president, president Taft had to have the furniture in the white house remade to fit his girth. It is rumored that he got stuck in the White House bathtub.

He was the first president to have a car and the last one to have a cow (for milk, of course).



Woodrow Wilson (1913-1921)

President Wilson's face is on the \$100,000 bill.

He was the first president to visit Europe while holding presidential office.

He said his earliest memory was hearing that Lincoln had been elected president.



Warren G. Harding (1921-1923)

President Harding was the first president to talk on the radio!

He wore a size 19 shoe, making his feet the biggest of any president before him or since.

He was the first president to be voted in after women were allowed to vote.



Calvin Coolidge (1923-1929)

President Coolidge was known for his interesting choice of pets. While in office he had two pet raccoons named Reuben & Rebecca. It was rumored that sometimes they ran around the White House!

He was born on the 4th of July (1872).



Herbert Hoover (1929-1933)

After spending sometime in China as a young couple, president Hoover and his wife would speak Mandarin when they wanted to have a private conversation in the White House.

He had two pet alligators when he was president.



Franklin D. Roosevelt (1933-1945)

Our only 'differently abled' president, FDR was confined to a wheelchair. Even so, he was a very influential president!

He loved his dog, Fala. Fala was so popular that he had a movie made about him and he was buried with him in the presidential memorial.



Harry S. Truman (1945-1953)

President Truman met his wife, Bess, in Sunday School when they were both 6 years old.

The S. in his name doesn't stand for anything.



Dwight D. Eisenhower (1953-1961)

President Eisenhower started the Interstate Highway System we still use today.

He named Camp David.

He admitted Alaska and Hawaii into the United States when he was president.



John F. Kennedy (1961-1963)

President Kennedy was the first Boy Scout to be elected president.

He was the youngest ever to be elected (at age 43). Teddy Roosevelt was younger (42) but he came into office due to the death of President McKinley.



Lyndon B. Johnson (1963-1969)

President Johnson appointed the first African- American to the Supreme Court.

Quoted as saying "Education is not a problem. Education is an opportunity."

Second tallest president at 6' 3 1/2".



Richard Nixon (1969-1974)

President Nixon was the only president ever to resign the presidency.

He had a bowling alley built in the basement of the White House.

While he was president, the voting age was lowered from 21 to 18.



Gerald R. Ford (1974-1977)

President Ford was the only president who served, even though he was never elected by the public.

His middle name was Rudolph.

He was a well-known Eagle Scout. 400 Eagle Scouts came to his funeral.



Jimmy Carter (1977 - 1981)

President Carter was the first person from his father's side of the family to graduate high school.

He won the Nobel Peace Prize in 2002 for his human rights efforts.

He was an avid reader and could read at incredible speeds!



Ronald Reagan (1981-1989)

As a young man, President Reagan worked as a life guard and saved 77 people.

He was an Hollywood actor!

His favorite snack was Jelly Belly jellybeans.



George H.W. Bush (1989-1993)

When he passed away, President George Bush and his wife (Barbra) had been married for 73 years.

He was a pilot in World War 2.

He was given a Knighthood by the queen of England.



William J. Clinton (1993-2001)

President Clinton played the saxophone in a band he called "Three Blind Mice".

Balanced the federal budget for the first time in many years.

His wife ran for president against our current president, Donald Trump.



George W. Bush (2001-2009)

President Bush was a wonderful high-school cheerleader.

He enjoyed running and even ran a marathon once.

He likes Mexican food and Pralines & Cream ice-cream.



Barack Obama (2009-2017)

President Obama does not like ice-cream. It's said that that comes from him working at Baskin-Robbins as a teen.

He was the first African-American to ever be elected president.

He was born in Honolulu, Hawaii.



Donald Trump (2017-present)

At 70 years of age, president Trump was the oldest president ever to be sworn into office.
